
## **SEWING ON A BUTTON**


Surely everyone knows how to sew on a button? Well, you would be amazed how many people no longer have this skill. For all you men out there who have somehow survived so far without The Knowledge, here you are...




**1** Find a button of the appropriate size - should you not have the original, of course. Make sure the button is a comfortbale fit by posting it through the hole.



Thread your needle (with the help of a needle-threader, if you have sausage fingers) and line up where your button should be. This is very important. A good tip is to put a little mark with thread. needle or even chalk there if you must. Oh, and unless you're looking to make a statement, match your thread to the shade of the button.



**3** Coming from the back of the garment – button in place, push your needle up through one of the little holes in the middle (there should be two or four) and pull until you have just a small tail remaining at the back.



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
